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## When Climate Grief Becomes Collective Power

In a significant step toward justice for climate disaster survivors, the Women for Loan Relief collective, formed by women affected by the 2024 Chooralmala–Mundakkai landslides in Wayanad, has secured a major victory in the Kerala High Court. Their persistence has brought national attention to the plight of hundreds who lost homes, land, and livelihoods in last year's catastrophe, only to face loan recovery notices from banks even while living in relief camps.

As Bar & Bench reported, the Kerala High Court, in a strongly worded interim

order, rebuked the Union Government for its refusal to waive the loans of affected families. The Bench of Justices A.K. Jayasankaran Nambiar and Jobin Sebastian described the Centre's stance as a "failure of duty" and an "affront to the victims' dignity under Article 21." The Court noted that the Union Government, while claiming helplessness under RBI guidelines, had in fact amended the Disaster Management Act in 2025 to disallow such waivers, effectively closing the door on one of the few avenues for financial relief. The Court drew a sharp contrast between the humane response of the Kerala


Bank, which had written off loans for those affected, and the Centre's rigid

insistence on bureaucratic procedure. "If it is unwillingness to act, say so openly," the Bench remarked, admonishing the Centre for hiding behind technicalities. Respecting the principle of separation of powers, the Court refrained from directing the Union to declare a waiver but ordered 12 major banks, including SBI, PNB, Canara Bank, Indian Bank, and Kerala Gramin Bank, to suspend all loan recovery proceedings until the final disposal of the case. The banks have been directed to state whether they will waive the loans wholly or partially, or to justify their recovery efforts in light of the borrowers' losses. The Court's observation that "governance cannot hide behind procedural

walls" should resonate beyond Wayanad. As extreme weather events become more frequent and devastating, the case underscores the urgent need for climate-sensitive banking frameworks—ones that balance fiscal discipline with empathy, and recognise the fundamental right to live with dignity. - Team CFA




